# **New Behaviour Block**

Mr Tickle gave an assembly to reflect on the end of the first Behaviour block of the year. There have been lots of improvements across Years 7-9, but highlights include:

- 300 fewer negative points from Year 8 (when compared to their last Block in Year 7)
- Year 9 have improved their attendance to above the national average and have reduced the number of warnings and removals received.
- Year 7 have received the fewest negative points across the school, averaging fewer than five negative points per pupil.

Jack S has scored 7 goals in 4 games






## Geography









### **Religious Education**

School in Winshill. In February 1917, he was
awarded the Military Medal for rescuing a
wounded officer from no man's land. In July
1917, he was awarded the DCM for
"conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in
evacuating wounded from the front line."

Janine Webber Holocaust Survivor

### **History - Sixth Form Visit to Auschwitz (A student account)**

The core message that has remained with me from my experience with The Lessons from Auschwitz programme has been imperative notion to humanise the victims of the Holocaust.

I have come to refine my definition of the holocaust to 'The murder of approximately six million Jewish men, women and children by Nazi Germany and its collaborators during the Second World War'.

The significance of individualising victims, the most emotionally resonant part of my experience, was Janine's testimony as a Holocaust survivor.

Janine was born in Lvov, Poland where 150,000 Jews resided prior to the war. Devastatingly less than 2% of the Jewish population in Lvov survived the Holocaust. In 1941, Germany began moving Eastwards towards Russian-occupied Poland, at this point the Gestapo began rounding up Jewish men; for a young Janine, this was disorientating and frightening. Just one of the profound agonising events endured by Janine was the shooting of her cousins and father before her own eyes. Janine was moved from place to place during wartime and experienced much tragedy, such tragedy that no person should have to experience in their lifetime: the death of her mother and her brother being buried alive.

Janine was a survivor. This is just one story of the approximate six million Jews affected by the Holocaust. Each has their own story, their own family - their own life that was snatched from them.

My experience with the Lessons From Auschwitz Trust has brought to my attention how essential it is to share stories, insights and the international implications of the events of the Holocaust. On the visit to Auschwitz one, I saw a quotation that stated: 'The holocaust was an event initiated by humans. It happened once and therefore it can happen again'. By sharing my knowledge of the Holocaust I hope to enlighten others and encourage them to share their own knowledge to ensure that not only the Holocaust and antisemitism but any discrimination against minority groups is eradicated. Regarding Janine's testimony, she left us with a valuable message: be kind. Though simple, I believe it is something that we overlook at times and that everyone should be reminded of.








### **History**

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


# The Duke of Edinburgh's Award


