

- Attendance meetings with parents and students


Why are we doing this? There is a direct correlation between attendance and achievement.


Onward Together

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History

On Tuesday 14th January Year 11 GCSE History students visited Hardwick Hall in Derbyshire as part of their taught unit on Elizabethan England.

Students learned about the Hall being built to impress. It was largely made with materials from her own quarries, lead mines and estates. She employed the top architect of the time and ensured that her home reflected the new fashionable Renaissance designs of the time which included glass, symmetry, columns, loggias and opulence. All of this was achieved by Bess of Hardwick - a woman who had risen in wealth and status during this period and she was not afraid to show it.







Did you know? - Local History

Tutbury Castle and Mary Queen of Scots

Mary, Queen of Scots spent long periods there as the prisoner of Elizabeth I. Her first visit was in 1569; she was held there on and off over the next fifteen years. Mary loathed Tutbury; she described it as "sitting squarely on top of a mountain in the middle of a plain". Mary's stay came to an end in 1585. In 1646, during the English Civil War, Tutbury Castle fell to Parliamentary forces. After a siege it was destroyed leaving the ruins visible today.



Year 13 - Stan P- Geography - For his excellent start to his NEA Geography project.










Mercia continue to lead the house points competition - well done to all students in Mercia. Chadwick are currently in 2nd place, but need a large number of House Points to catch Mercia.






Remember you can earn house points in a number of ways:

- Showing respect, taking responsibility or demonstrating resilience






The Duke of Edinburgh's Award




